
# Gods Handy-vvorke in VVONDERS.

A brother and after they were, and yet I know not whether I may to tearme them : but if I could give thefe names buto them, pet nener were Brother and Sifter fo bus like to one another, or to those that did beget them. For the one was a woman perfectly framed in all her lumbes, taming that the body was pyned away, and by that meanes, meagre and leane. But the fecond infortunate burden that came a long with her , was neither a Boother nog a Sifter, but 13oth: for it was an Hermaphrodite, it was neither man no; woman, but fuch as you might call both man and woman: yet inclining rather to the forme of woman than man, han fomely composed from the Nauil bownewards, but a Monfer bywards, and below the knas : fo; one leg was greater than the other; and either fote had no more then fower toes. Pead it had none, not necke, but in the breft Aucke out a bunched peece of deformed fiell, which like a flap, beeing to bee lifted by, it carried bnoer neath, the fathion of a mouth with a tongue, and choppes, yet were they neither. Aboue this deformed mouth, grew forth a tuft of have, the breath

of a teston, and more, and a full inch in breath; out of the right Ave, came a thing like an arme, altogether foundelle and with. outbones, or the true shape of a hand, having two fingers onely, towards either fide one. this birth was very wonderfull, and fone of many crecible perfons that doe witnesse hereunto, and hath been openly be clared, and published throughout the whole Cowne of Arnheim, and chaunced as bereafter followeth.

A Citizens wife in the lavo Sowne, a comely woman twoole name for certains causes I let palle being great with Chilo, and laked energoday, her Dusband, being one that has almost front al his gods amongst whores and thereer did not leane the fame, but without any regard of his Wife, or her time fo neere, followed his naughtie accustomed ble. leane thy whose hunting, but be alwaics in their companie, both orinhen and halfe madds, the which I wofull woman must both heare and fie.

Whis her anger the returned home againe, and fhote limiter the time came; as some as the neighbours and Midturfe there come, there began has being great paines to ery out fearefully, and not long after to as bought a bed of this wolkberfull Bouter, with so fearefull proposition of him was the which affoone as the women was believed thereof, it rame underneath the bedde. The proposition of his body and time was as hereafter followeth, and was seene of many persons, toth men and women, which witnesse the fame openly.

First, this Chilo being a Honter, was over his whole body bery rough with happe, and all blacke, except his belly which was like a Swanne.

Sirtly, it had two hornes vpon his head, which hung of uer him.

Senenthly, it has in Keabe of hands and fingers, claives like buts a fowle.

In fumme it was not found in any point like to a Thinth an body: but was very fearefull and hourible to behold.

After that it had now (with great trembling and feare) been feene of many men in the towne, and energy man aftonive thereat, in the end they fmothered it betweet two beds and contiled it
